Raise Some Vegetables, Raise Some Money!

New 4-H Opportunity for High School Students

Lincoln County high school students have an opportunity to grow their own vegetables and become an entrepreneur through a new project of the 4-H Sustainable Living Club.

An informational meeting will be held March 1 at 1 p.m. at the Toledo Library. Youth and parents are encouraged to attend.

The 4-H Sustainable Living Club's idea is simple: Club members receive a portable EarthBarrel garden complete with everything needed to raise vegetables at home. Youth then can use the food they grow for their family or donate or sell it at the 4-H booth at the farmers' market. The 4-H members keep all proceeds.

The EarthBarrel garden is the first of the entrepreneurial projects planned by the 4-H Sustainable Living Club. The club already manages a 7,500-square-foot garden in Toledo using the latest gardening techniques to develop a local, organic, sustainable food source.

These projects are being funded by a grant from the Oregon State University Youth Advocates for Health (YA4-H!) program, which supports local organizations in creating youth-developed community gardens in communities with limited resources.

The EarthBarrel approach to gardening has several advantages, including mobility and the ability to get a jump on local in-ground producers. Food production on the Oregon Coast is challenging because

the cold spring rains keep the ground cold usually until June or early July.

An EarthBarrel, on the other hand, is half full of water that stores the heat of the sun and gives it back to the plants at night.

Because the barrels are portable, they can be placed anywhere they have full sun – a deck, yard, sidewalk, whatever is available. Thus with an EarthBarrel garden, a tomato plant can be planted in April and potentially produce ripe tomatoes by July.

These 4-H projects include financial components that teach what it takes to operate a food production business as well as the horticultural skills needed to manage a sustainable organic garden.

Youth in the 4-H Sustainable Living Club learn to grow food with and without soil; manage a greenhouse, including mini-greenhouses (cloches); and use a water wicking system and subterranean heating and cooling systems as well as employ aquaponics and a compost hot water system.

High school students who want to learn how to use chemical-free organic practices to raise food for their family or earn extra money should attend the March 1 meeting.

Lincoln City's Festival of Illusions Set for Spring Break

It's no illusion. Lincoln City is magic for spring break and we're not just talking about the long, sandy beaches and the glass float giveaways.

During Oregon's Spring Break (March 24-28), the Lincoln City Cultural Center will present the third annual Festival of Illusions. The festival is a week of evening magic shows and fun day camps for youth, all held at LCCC, 540 NE Highway 101.

For the evening shows, the doors will open at 6:30 p.m., with curtain at 7 p.m. Last year, two shows sold out, so get your tickets early. To purchase or to learn more, call 541-994-9994.

The evening performance series will open March 24 with the impressive Joe Black. A magician and mentalist from Seattle, Black is back by popular demand as one of the most popular magicians in the 2013 festival.

He was awarded the Rising Star Award two years in a row and was a televised finalist on *America's Got Talent*. His *Black Magic* show is a real crowd pleaser and is appropriate for older children and adults.

Tickets for Black's show, a two-set magic show with an intermission, are \$10 in advance and \$12 at

the door. Kids 12 and under are \$9 in advance and \$8 at the door.

On March 25, older children and adults will thrill to the comedy magic of Steve Hamilton – aka "Steve the Pretty Good." He's performed around the world – from Shanghai to Indiana – for the past 20 years.

Known for his spontaneous humor and original routines, Hamilton offers the classics of magic with his own funny twist and transforms his audience into his magical assistants. Does someone get sawn in half? You bet. Can he make someone float? Absolutely.

Tickets for Hamilton's show, a two-set magic show with an intermission, are \$10 in advance and \$12 at the door. Kids 12 and under are \$9 in advance and \$8 at the door.

For a family-oriented show appropriate for all ages, check out Jeff Evans on March 26. His friendly style of magic receives top reviews for family entertainment.

A full-time pro since 1998, Evans' amazing magic and clean comedy is honed to its best in more than 250 shows each year. Fan favorites include Sparky the Trained Chicken and his "ridiculously dangerous"

escape stunt from ropes, chains and padlocks. No wonder he was named the 2013 Seattle's Funniest Magician and received *ParentMap Magazine's* 2013 Golden Teddy Award for Best Live Entertainment. She's also the mother of four boys, so she knows how to handle a crowd.

LCCC also offers Magic Camps from 9-11 a.m. daily on March 24-28. Registration is open for children age 5 to 18 and the price (\$15 per day) includes props and instruction by local magician Danny Roberson.

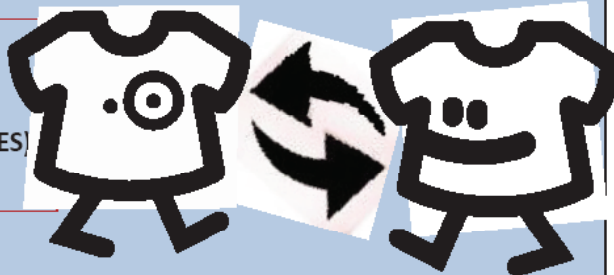

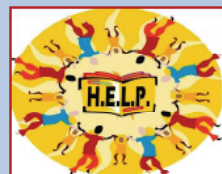

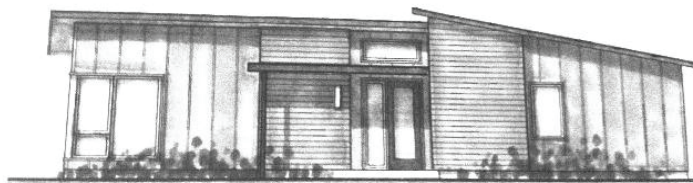

Elk Tag Opportunity Available for Tribal Member Hunters

The Tribal Natural Resources Department once again will offer a limited number of landowner preference (LOP) elk tags to Tribal members for this fall's hunting season.

As a landowner, the Tribe is eligible to participate in the State's LOP program. Based on the number of acres the Tribe owns, we can get six additional antlerless elk tags from the State.

These LOP tags are not related to the Tribe's Consent Decree tags that we receive each year. They are based solely on the Tribe being a landowner.

There are a number of important differences between the LOP tags and the Tribe's regular tags. These are summarized in the table below.

	Tribal Tags	LOP Tags
State license required?	No	Yes
Area to be hunted	Anywhere within the specific tag's hunt boundaries	Only on Tribal land within the unit selected during that unit's antlerless elk season. Units available include Upper Siletz, NW Alsea, SW Alsea, SW Alsea Private Lands and West Siuslaw
Eligible for other State elk tags?	Yes	No*
Give tag to another Tribal member to hunt for you?	Yes	No
Application and selection process	Apply to Tribe for Tribal drawing	Apply to Tribe for LOP drawing; if selected, apply to State for tag (list LOP as first choice on State application)
Obtain Tag From	Tribe	State
* Note: If you are drawn for an LOP tag, you are still eligible to apply for and be drawn for a Tribal tag.		

Please note that a major difference between the LOP tags and the Tribe's regular tags is that **only** the person drawn for the tag can hunt that tag. **The tag cannot be given to someone else to hunt for you.** Therefore, only those folks serious about hunting this hunt themselves are eligible to apply.

The drawing for the six LOP elk tags will be held at the Natural Resources Committee meeting on April 7 at 4:45 p.m. in the Natural Resources Department Map Room. Applications are available on the Tribal website and at the Tribal Natural Resources Office in Siletz.

Completed applications are due in the Natural Resources office by **4:30 p.m. on April 4.**
