School-Based Health Centers are Up and Running

School is back in session and that means quality affordable health care for Lincoln County students is as close as the nearest high school.

For more than two decades, Taft, Toledo, Newport and Waldport high schools have been home to full-service health care clinics that provide a complete range of behavioral health and physical health services, including immunizations, to Lincoln County School District students.

Students in kindergarten through 12th grade are served at these centers. Fees are determined on a sliding scale based on the ability to pay.

The clinics are operated by the Lincoln County Health and Human Services Department's (HHS) Lincoln Community Health Center and are the result of a long-term partnership between the county and the school district.

"The clinics provide important, and sometimes life-saving, services to local students," said Commissioner Terry Thompson, a long-time advocate for the clinics who once served on a state advisory committee for school-based health centers.

"We're very proud of the quality of care we offer," said Rebecca McBee-Wilson, HHS division director for the Lincoln Community Health Center.

All of the county's primary care clinics are staffed by licensed professionals, including nurse practitioners, registered nurses and mental health counselors and therapists. Oversight is provided by Dr. Edward Brown, medical director of the Lincoln Community Health Center.

"We offer both convenience and choice for students and their parents," McBee-Wilson added.

Although most services are provided by appointment, limited walk-in hours also are available.

"That means a busy parent can schedule a lunch hour appointment for their child," McBee-Wilson said.

Siuslaw National Forest invites applicants for temporary seasonal jobs

Corvallis, OR – The Siuslaw National Forest is hiring up to 50 temporary seasonal workers to support several program areas in 2015. Positions will be open to applicants in three phases beginning in January for jobs with start dates in March, April, and, for the majority, June.

The positions will be based in Siuslaw National Forest offices along the Oregon coast, with duty stations in Hebo, Waldport, Reedsport, and Florence. There may also be up to two openings in Corvallis. Temporary seasonal positions serve in different program areas, including fire, timber, interpretation, volunteer coordination, customer service, and recreation.

“Seasonal employment with the Forest Service is a great way to learn new skills, see what it takes to manage public lands, and have fun,” says Jerry Ingersoll, Forest Supervisor for the Siuslaw National Forest. “We rely on the extra help we get from our energetic seasonal staff to get us through the busy summer months.”

Applicants interested in these jobs will be able to apply through www.usajobs.gov. Vacancy announcements for positions will be posted there in three different time periods.

- The **first opportunity** for candidates to apply will be for all temporary fire-related positions, with the possibility of certain job openings in other program areas as well. Applications will be accepted for these positions Jan. 6-12.
- The **second round of applications** will be accepted for all non-fire-related positions not addressed in the January job announcement. Applications will be accepted for this round of hiring Feb. 4-10.
- The **third opportunity** for applying for a temporary position will be in March.

Fun-Filled Antique Week Set for Early February in Lincoln City

Lincoln City's Antique Week is celebrating Lincoln City's 50th anniversary with this year's theme of Cheers to 50 Years!

Antique Week is actually 10 fun-filled days of antiquing from Feb. 7-16. The schedule includes a scavenger hunt, an "Appraise-a-thon," an engaging lecture, historic city bus tours, a Valentine's Day concert and dance lesson, glass floats on the beach, special attractions at the North Lincoln County Historical Museum and Driftwood Public Library, an Antique Boutique at the Lincoln City Cultural Center, themed Saturday movies at the Bijou Theatre and sales in almost every antique shop in town.

The event will kick off Feb. 7 with the Appraise-a-thon from 1-3 p.m. at Chinook Winds Casino Resort.

Frank Farmer Loomis IV, a former appraiser for *Antiques Roadshow*

and writer/co-producer of the PBS television series *Is It Antique Yet?*, will appraise antiques and collectibles for a fee of \$10 per item.

Directly following the Appraise-a-thon, Loomis will give a lecture at 3 p.m. on the topic *Antiques 101: A Crash Course in Antiquing*. Loomis' speaking style has been described as lively, laced with anecdotes, often humorous and never boring. The talk is free and is sponsored by the Lincoln City Cultural Center and Chinook Winds Casino Resort.

A scavenger hunt will take place over the 10 days with participants visiting local antique shops to find questions and corresponding answers to trivia of Lincoln City history. Maps and entry forms are available at antique dealers and at the Cultural Center. Correctly answered entries will receive a chance to spin the "prize wheel" (every spin wins!).

Participating dealers include Little Antique Mall, Carousel by the Beach, Rocking Horse Mall, Granny's Attic, The Kelp Bed, Lincoln City Antiques & Music, Lincoln City Cultural Center, Days Catch, Nelscott House Antiques, Robert's Bookshop, JS Coins, Taft 2nd Hand, 101 Coastal Creations, AA Home Furnishings and Antiques, Tam's Plaza, Pop Culture Collectibles, Pacific Coast Books and North by Northwest Books & Antiques.

The City of Lincoln City will hide 300 antique Japanese glass floats on the beach throughout the week, as well as 50 solid red floats and 14 red heart-shaped glass pieces on Valentine's Day weekend. Finders are encouraged to register their floats with the Information Center located in the Cultural Center, 541-994-3302.

Elizabeth Black will lead "mostly accurate" and always entertaining historic city bus tours on Feb. 10 and Feb. 12 at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. The 10 a.m. tours will cover south Lincoln City; 2 p.m. tours will cover the north end.

Explore local history as you travel through the communities that, in 1965, incorporated to become Lincoln City. The tours are free, but reservations are required. Call 541-994-9994 to reserve your spot. Chinook Winds Casino Resort is providing the bus.

The Lincoln Pops will provide danceable music at 7 p.m. on Valentine's Day (Feb. 14) at the Lincoln City Cultural Center. Tickets are \$14 each, \$25 per couple.

A beginner's swing dance lesson will be held from 6-6:45 p.m. for an additional \$5. For more information and reservations, call 541-994-9994.

The North Lincoln County Historical Museum will have a special display of Lincoln City's history. Admission to the museum is free thanks to a grant from the City of Lincoln City.

The Driftwood Public Library will feature a display of books related to this year's theme.

The Bijou Theatre will show themed movies at 11 a.m. on Feb. 7 and Feb. 14.

An Antique Boutique will be set up in the Cultural Center for the duration of the event. Members will sell their antiques with a percentage going to benefit the Cultural Center, which will be open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. every day of Antique Week. Call 541-994-9994 to participate.
