## Fresh Steelhead Season Coming Up

We expect to begin receiving fresh whole-bodied steelhead in Siletz from the Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife's Siletz River fish trap sometime in late June and continuing into the summer.

**Distribution will be done by Natural Resources staff at the east side of the old USDA building.**

We only get a couple hours notice that we will receive fish on any particular day, so if you want to receive a phone call or email that we are expecting fish that day, please contact Natural Resources Manager Mike Kennedy at 541-444-8232 or Natural Resources Administrative Assistant Rosie Williams at 541-444-8227 to get on our notification list.

Please note that we will **not** accept notes to pick up fish for someone else. Instead, we will allow each **household** that shows up to pick up from one to three fish, depending on the number of fish we get that day. We encourage folks to share their fish with other family members and neighbors.

## Lincoln County Parks Department Announces Closure of A.W. Jack Morgan Boat Ramp

This ramp and parking lot are scheduled for construction and will be closed June 15. This work should be completed by Aug. 31.





Housed at our very own Siletz Tribal Head Start classroom, teacher Janna Limbert and staff will provide small-group and one-on-one reading education. Students will be assessed at entry and will have custom programming designed to meet their individual needs.

Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8-11:30 a.m. at the Siletz Tribal Head Start classroom

**Mission:** To make reading fun while ensuring that Tribal youth maintain and even enhance their

reading skills over the summer months. Reading is an essential skill for our children. Listening to and reading books throughout the summer months will help our kids perform better in school and raises their self-esteem.

**Parent commitment:** Numerous studies have shown that reading over the summer months prevents “reading loss” for children. Good reading skills are essential for the success of our children. Read to your child every day. Here are a few helpful tips for parents:

- ✓ Reading and re-reading easy books is a great way to build

your child’s reading skills (and self-esteem).

- ✓ Review basic sight words with your child to make sure he or she knows these words automatically.
- ✓ Set aside reading practice time every day. Even 5 minutes of reading practice will help develop their skills.
- ✓ Model good reading habits.

## Siletz Tribal Charitable Contribution Fund (STCCF) Tribal Member Advisory Board Member Recruitment

The Siletz Tribal Charitable Contribution Fund Board is currently accepting applications from Tribal members for a three-year appointment beginning July 2014 through June 2017. Applications must be received before June 30, 2014.

The Siletz Tribal Charitable Contribution Fund Advisory Board is comprised of seven unpaid members, including a Siletz Tribal Council representative; three Siletz Tribal members; two non-Tribal members agreed upon by the governor and Tribal chairman and approved by the Tribal Council; and one non-Tribal member selected by the Tribal chairman and approved by the Tribal Council from a list submitted by the governor.

The board receives travel reimbursement only for attendance at meetings, distributions and other approved public relations events. The advisory board meets quarterly (January, April, July and October) to review approximately 100 applications received from charitable organizations or local governments.

Many returning soldiers bring wars back with them that can reach beyond the battlefield or firefight, infiltrating the very thing that defines comfort and safety – home. The trials of homecoming are vast and complex.
