
June is Cancer Awareness Month. Cancer, known medically as a malignant neoplasm, is a broad group of various diseases, all involving unregulated cell growth. In cancer, cells divide and grow uncontrollably, forming malignant tumors, and invade nearby parts of the body. The cancer may also spread to more distant parts of the body through the lymphatic system or bloodstream. Not all tumors are cancerous. Benign tumors do not grow uncontrollably, do not invade neighboring tissues, and do not spread throughout the body. There are over 200 different known cancers that afflict humans.

Determining what causes cancer is complex. Many things are known to increase the risk of cancer, including tobacco use, certain infections, radiation, lack of physical activity, obesity, and environmental pollutants. These can directly damage genes or combine with existing genetic faults within cells to cause the disease. Approximately five to ten percent of cancers are entirely hereditary.

A Lavender Ribbon has been used to designate General Cancer Awareness. This can acknowledge any of the cancers that do not have a specific awareness color, or it may be used to represent a variety of different cancers that families might have experienced. Many of the items below are designed and created especially for general cancer awareness, as noted by the lavender ribbon. Some of the products are not as specific but will provide humor, inspiration, and strength for all cancer survivors and their families and friends.



SNACK CRACKERS



1 pkg ranch dressing 1 sleeve crackers

red pepper flakes (to taste)
1/4 to 1/2 c oil (vegetable, olive or grapeseed)

Put crackers in a zip lock bag. Drizzle with oil and add the powdered ranch dressing mix and pepper flakes. Seal the bag with some air in it and turn it over until the crackers are coated. Let stand for a day (any longer and they become stale).

You can also substitute garlic powder and parmesan cheese in place of the ranch dressing and pepper flakes. Experiment with your favorite seasonings. **Enjoy**!

Countdown To The Great American Eclipse



The first total solar eclipse touching the continental United States since 1979 touches down on the Oregon coast between Lincoln City and Newport on August 21, 2017 at 10:15 a.m. PDT. Before Oregon, the shadow of the Moon (umbra) does not touch any other landmass or island.

Oregon will be one of the most popular states to view the eclipse. While the rest of the United States offers a longer duration of totality, sections of the eclipse path in Oregon offers the best weather prospects anywhere along the entire eclipse path. Protect your eyes!

While the eclipse's totality can be viewed with the naked eye, the rest of it should be viewed with some kind of eye protection. Remember that you'll be *staring at the sun*. NASA recommends wearing glasses with a special filter (you can use number 14 welders glass or buy paper glasses).

The Home Visiting program is open to American Indian/ Alaskan Native families when they are expecting a child or have a child under the age of one. The program then continues until the child turns three. The program is designed to increase parenting knowledge and skills, link families to resources and provide encouragement to help parents engage in positive parenting. We would like to welcome the new Voc Rehab Director, Jeramie Martin. Jeramie was in Siletz working as a Job Developer in Voc Rehab.

The Siletz Tribal Vocational Rehabilitation program (STVRP) is here to assist members of any federally recognized Tribe (living within the Siletz Tribes service area) with overcoming impediments to employment. We work with a diverse population of individuals who have disabilities ranging from cognitive impairments to physical limitations.

If you have a documented disability that creates limitations or prevents you from doing the work you desire or are qualified for, we would like to assist you. We can assist with obtaining and maintaining employment and developing skills. We focus on motivation, identifying your abilities, skills that lead to successful employment and the development of self advocacy.

You should have a strong desire to work and be willing to work collaboratively with STVRP staff to provide you with the services needed to overcome your disability. Your personal goal should be self sufficiency and to live a healthy sustainable lifestyle.

The STVRP also assists transitioning students with disabilities. The ideal age for a student to start working with VR is two to three years before graduation and until the age 22, or graduated from high school. Our program can provide vocational guidance and counseling; assist with identification of employment goals; employment retention; and advocacy within the academic environment. Students with a documented disability or who are on an "Individualized Education Plan ~ IEP" or on a "504 Plan" are encouraged to participate in the STVRP.

The Dry Drunk Syndrome

Dry refers to the fact that we've stopped drinking or using other drugs. Drunk means that using a chemical has left us powerless and our lives unmanageable and we exhibit behaviors that may seem the same when we were still drinking or using. These words suggest intoxication without alcohol or other drugs.

Sobriety has its ups and downs, its good times and bad times. Changes, shocks, and setbacks are normal and when we address these we can still stay sober. Dry drunk syndrome, however, is different; it's not a catch-all term for every bad day we have or very bump in life we may hit. Dry drunk describes a problem, not a person. The point is not to condemn ourselves but to admit the truth and move on. Some signs and attitudes of dry drunk includes;

- Grandiosity
- Judgmentalsim
- Intolerance
- Impulsivity

- Indecisiveness
- Denying

- Rationalizing
- Projecting

- Overreacting

- This syndrome is correctable with the proper support whether it's a AA/NA meeting or a personal therapist or ceremonies that keep you balanced using anything that will help you look at your own behaviors and work through them will give you the support you need. The support is there. All we have to do is ask and follow through with it. Remember before any relapse, there is a dry drunk that goes untreated. So know the signs and reach out for the help. Its all about your recovery and a better life.

For children and adults still in school, summer can also be a time of turmoil, brought on by the lack of a daily schedule. It may be a time that parents ease their kids off medications that are necessary during the school year.

Here are some things to keep in mind to help summer be enjoyable for all, and a time of mental health:

- 1) Exercise- Go out and do a fun physical activity; 30 minutes souls. The summer is a great time to get outdoors and go do hikes, go to the pools that are opening back up.
- 2) Try and create a routine, and stick to it more days than not. Of course, things will come up, just get back to that routine when you
- 3) Sit your children down (or yourself) and discuss goals and expectations for the summer months. Everyone breathes a bit

- more easy when it's known what should be happening.
- yourself and your family a feelings check-in; this way you can catch depression and anxiety before they get out of hand.
- Meditation, relaxation-take time each day to sit and reflect, and unwind from the day's stresses. Don't forget, if you aren't caring for yourself, it will be harder to care for others.

Traditionally, summer is the time of salmon fishing, clam gathering, and berry picking. There are many plants every day can do so much for our important to the tribe that get picked during the summer. If you're unfamiliar with such activities, reach out to an elder, for they truly have a wealth of knowledge.
