Changes Coming for CTSI Childcare **Assistance Program**

Beginning May 1, 2023 changes to the CTSI Childcare Assistance Program will be in effect. These changes include the return of Co-payments for families with incomes above the Federal Poverty Level and new Payment Rates for Providers.

Co-payments are based upon household income and household size, and range from 1% up to 4%. Payment Rates for Providers are based on the geographic area or zip code of the Provider and their qualifications and training.

The CTSI Childcare Assistance Program helps CTSI tribal families living in the CTSI 11 county service area to pay for their childcare expenses while they participate in a work activity.


Work activities include working, looking for work, students, or participating in a job training program. To be eligible, children must be 12 vears of age or younger, and either an enrolled member of the CTSI, or eligible to enroll in the CTSI, or be the descendant or dependent of an enrolled member of the CTSI.

Higher Education assists Tribal Members to attend college towards their Bachelors Degree (up to 5 years of educational support funding). To be eligible for the next academic year, the deadline is June 30, 2023.

Applications to apply for Federal student Aid (FAFSA is required for all students) opens October 1. 2023

Adult Vocational Training Program: Supports Tribal Members for up to two years of specific vocational training.



Disability Awareness: Strokes

Strokes are a disease that with words overlapping others. affect the arteries and brain. Strokes damage the brain tissue from the loss of blood flow to the brain. A stroke a medical emergency. Prompt treatment is crucial. Getting treatment early can reduce brain damage and other complications.

Types and Causes:

- obstructing flow of blood to the brain. It happens when the brain's blood vessels become narrowed or blocked. This causes severely reduced blood flow. This is the most common type of stroke.
- Hemorrhagic Stroke: Blood vessels rupturing and preventing blood flow to the brain.
- Transient ischemic attack (TIA): This is sometimes known as a mini stroke that is a temporary period of symptoms similar to those in a stroke. This type of stroke does not cause permanent damage. It is caused by a temporary decrease in blood supply to the brain. This can last as little as five minutes.

Symptoms:

- Paralysis: Face Drooping
- Confusion: This can cause disorientation and fogginess in the mind.
- Slurred speech: A person may be unable to speak coherently

They may be unable to remember words from their memory.

- Numbness in Limbs: Numbness in the limbs will occur on the onset of a stroke. The numbness typically affects one side of the body. It depends on the location of the clot.
- Blurred Vision: A person's sight may blur and have a temporary loss of vision. It • Ischemic Stroke: A clot may also cause a person to blackout.
 - Headache: A stroke can cause pain in the head region.
 - Dizziness: Vertigo may present from visual disturbance and confusion.
 - Gait Disturbance: Coordinated movements can be lost in the body, which can cause the person to not walk properly.

Other stroke facts:

- · Stroke kills twice as many women each year than breast cancer.
- Strokes in children are increasing at an alarming rate. Up 50 percent, among young boys over 12 years.
- The average stroke patient pays more than \$140,000 in lifetime medical bills.
- Every 40 seconds someone in the U.S. has a stroke, nearly 800.000 in 2012.

Risk factors:

- High blood pressure
- Smoking

- Diabetes
- High cholesterol levels
- Obesity
- Heart disease
- Heavy or binge drinking
- Use of illegal drugs
- Personal or family history of stroke

What about prevention? Up to 80% of strokes can be prevented by controlling risk factors such as:

- Controlling High blood pressure.
- Lowering the amount of Cholesterol and saturated fat in vour diet.
- Quitting tobacco use.
- Managing diabetes.
- Maintaining a healthy weight.
- Eating a diet rich in fruits and vegetables.
- Exercising regularly.
- Treating obstructive sleep apnea.

A stroke requires immediate medical attention. If you think you or someone else is having a stroke, have someone call 911 right away. Prompt treatment is key to preventing the following outcomes:

- Brain damage
- Long-term disability
- Death



Asthma and Allergy Awareness Month

Asthma affects more than 25 million Americans, and between February and early summer is when seasonal allergies can really give asthma suffering people the most trouble. Asthma is a chronic disease that causes the airways to become inflamed, making it hard to breath. There is no cure for asthma, however, it can be managed by avoiding triggers such as pollen, smoke, dust, and whatever you could be allergic to. It's best to carry your asthma medication when you're out and about just in case, and be mindful of symptoms like coughing, wheezing, or shortness of breath. With allergies being a big trigger for asthma, it's important to understand how allergies can affect us. Allergies occur when our body's immune system overreacts to a substance it sees as harmful. The immune system makes antibodies called immunoglobulin E (IgE), which respond to allergens. The resulting symptoms are an allergic reaction. People can be allergic to almost anything including pollen, food, pets, mold, and latex. Symptoms can include sneezing, hives or rash, swelling in the throat and mouth, and even anaphylaxis, which is a life threatening reaction. The best way to prevent allergies is to avoid allergens, and be sure to carry allergy medications you may need with you. Talk to your primary care provider if you have asthma or allergy concerns.




